As you consider running for your local school board, think about what being a board member means to you, your family and your community.

Oregon's school districts, education service districts (ESDs) and community college districts are governed by elected boards of five, seven, nine or 11 members that help direct the superintendent or college president run what may be the largest businesses in their communities. Board actions affect the families of hundreds of students and employees, now and for years to come.

Your duty will be representing all students, staff and members of the community as you work with other board members to craft policy.

School board authority rests with the board as a whole, not with individual board members. Board decisions are made by majority rule and, as one member of this ruling body, you will find yourself in the position of supporting some decisions that you voted against.

Board service often requires long unpaid hours working alone, on committees and with members of your community.
You'll struggle sometimes

to find solutions to complex problems – and still the solutions won't please everyone.

However, you'll have the satisfaction of watching students receive their diplomas, knowing that you played a role in their achievement. As an education board member, you will help shape tomorrow's citizens and leaders.

What does a school board do?

When you're elected to serve on the board, your education has just begun. Board service is like inheriting the reins of a corporation without any training. The "learning curve" for education leaders is steep. Plan to spend time in workshops and conferences. Training is essential to running a complex education system. OSBA equips board members with the leadership training they need to feel comfortable in their roles and to do their best.

The board's major responsibility is setting policy. The board hires a superintendent or college president who in turn hires staff to put policies into practice. The chief executive is accountable to the board for managing the district according to board policies.

Because they serve the community, board members must work with the public as they establish the mission and direction of education. It's up to the board to engage the community in public education.

A board member must be a skilled decision-maker and team player, a public-

education advocate, a vital link between community and school, and a policy maker.

As a public employer, the board establishes policies that govern the recruitment, employment, supervision, evaluation and dismissal of employees.

Board members must also do the following:

- · Establish budgets.
- Set goals and evaluate progress toward those goals.
- Ask voters to approve bond measures and local option levies for facilities and operations.
- · Guide collective bargaining.
- Choose transportation systems.
- Evaluate the superintendent, college president or chief executive.

How much time does being a good board member require?

School board service involves a substantial time commitment – and remember, there's no salary.

Boards typically meet one or two evenings a month. Before the monthly meetings, you'll need to study the materials provided (board packets) so you can make informed decisions.

A substantial time commitment is required of board members beyond meeting and meeting-preparation time. There are committee meetings, work sessions and appearances on behalf of the district. During collective bargaining with employee unions, you may find yourself immersed in a very time-consuming process.

OSBA offers training, answers, advice and many other resources year-round that save time and keep you up to date on school issues. Our workshops and conventions provide opportunities to meet peers from throughout the state and experts from around the country – more people on whom you can rely for help with board-related issues.

What makes a good board member?

Many of the qualities that make board members great are acquired over time, through training and experience, so don't discredit your potential worth as a board member, even though you may never have served in such a capacity.

As you consider running for the ESD, community college or school board, think about whether these characteristics of effective board members describe you:

- You hold a conviction that public education is important.
- You are committed to public involvement.
- · You have the ability to make decisions.
- You believe in the democratic process.
- You're willing to devote time and energy to your new position.
- You can accept the will of the majority.
- You have the courage to stand up for your convictions.
- You have respect for district employees.
- You communicate well with others.

These are some characteristics of ineffective board members:

- They become involved in school, ESD or community college administration.
- They allow personal feelings toward others to affect their judgment.
- They allow personal interests to transcend the best interests of the district.
- They neglect board duties.
- They can't make decisions or take a stand.
- They represent special interests or a particular geographic area rather than the interests of the entire district.
- They adopt an arrogant or paternalistic attitude toward district employees or the public.

How to become a candidate

Board members are elected to four-year terms. You must be a registered voter and you must have lived in the district for one year immediately preceding the election. School district, ESD and community college employees elected to serve on their board must give up employment with the district to sit on the board.

Board members are elected by zones or as at-large representatives. The procedure for choosing board members by zone or at large is determined at the district level. Board members elected at large may live anywhere in the district. Board members elected by zone may 1) live in the zone and be elected by all district voters or 2) live in the zone and be elected only by voters living within that zone.

Your county elections official, superintendent, college president or school board member can tell you how board members are elected in your district.

School board elections

Half of the board members in Oregon's schools, community colleges and ESDs are elected or re-elected in each odd-numbered year. Under Oregon law, school, ESD and community college board elections are held the third Tuesday in May.

The filing deadline for board positions is the 61st calendar day prior to the May election date. Candidates can file with the county clerk in one of two ways:

- Submit a petition containing the signatures of 25 registered voters or 10 percent of the registered voters in the district, whichever is less
- Submit a declaration of candidacy with a \$10 filing fee

All Oregon elections are by-mail ballots. Ballots are mailed to registered voters no sooner than the 18^{th} day before the date of the election and no later than the 14^{th} day.

To be counted, the county clerk must receive ballots by 8 p.m. on the date of the election. Voters may return the ballots by mail or in person. Ballots with election-day postmarks are not counted.

Your campaign

Board candidate campaigns range from simple to sophisticated, depending on the candidate and the community. One common element, however, is the state requirement for reporting campaign finances.

State law limits the sources and amounts of contributions and the purposes for which those contributions may be spent. Contact the Secretary of State Elections Division or your county elections office for guidance before accepting any campaign contributions or making any campaign expenditures.

By law, you must report all campaign finance transactions to the Secretary of State Elections Division. Political committees formed to support candidates also must report contributions and expenditures.

The candidate's treasurer and/or the treasurer of the political committee supporting the candidate is responsible for maintaining detailed records and filing reports of contributions received and expenditures made. These records are subject to inspection by an opposing candidate or that candidate's treasurer. These records must be kept current to within seven days of receiving a contribution or making an expenditure.

Board Member Qualifications

A person is eligible to serve as a Board member if he/she is an elector of the District. An "elector" means an individual qualified to vote under Section 2, Article II of the Oregon Constitution. The individual must be 18 years of age or older, registered to vote at least 20 calendar days immediately preceding any election in the manner provided by law and must have been a resident within the District for one year immediately preceding the election or appointment.

No person who is an employee of the District is eligible to serve as a Board member while so employed. A person who is an employee of a public charter school may not serve as a member of the Board of the district in which the public charter school that employs the person is located.

Board Functions

The Legislature of the State of Oregon delegates to the Board responsibility for the conduct and governance of programs and services of the District. The general powers granted to the Board are:

1. Legislative or Rule-Making Authority

In regular or special public meetings, after open discussion and after members' votes are recorded, the Board will establish rules or policy to govern the conduct of its members and the proceedings of the Board.

The Board shall establish policies and regulations for governing the programs and services of the District consistent with State Board of Education rules and with local, state, and federal laws.

The Board is responsible for providing adequate and direct means for keeping informed about the needs and wishes of the public and for keeping local citizens informed about the schools.

2. Judicial Authority

As provided by law, policy, or contract, the Board acts as a fact-finding body or a court of appeal for staff members, students, and the public when issues involve Board policies or agreements and their implementation, and when the Board must determine the rights, duties, or obligations of those who address the Board.

3. Executive/Administrative Authority

The Board will appoint a Superintendent delegated to establish administrative regulations to implement Board policy and goals. The Board will evaluate the Superintendent's performance.

The Board may establish academic and financial goals for the District and evaluate the Superintendent's implementation of those goals.

The Board will oversee the District's financial affairs by authorizing, appropriating, and adopting budgets, and by proposing local option or bond elections, when appropriate and as allowed by law, to provide for program operation and maintenance or acquisition of District property.

The Board will authorize the Superintendent to approve payment on all contracts and business transactions of the District in accordance with Board policies on purchasing and budget requirements. The Board will provide for an annual audit of the District's assets.

The Board will employ the staff necessary to carry out the educational program and will provide for regular evaluation of staff.

The Board will direct the collective bargaining process to establish collective bargaining agreements with the District's personnel. The Board will establish, through the collective bargaining process where appropriate, salaries and salary schedules, other terms and conditions of employment, and personnel policies for Districtwide application.

The Board will establish the days of the year and the hours of the day when school will be in session.

Board Powers and Duties

The Legislature of the State of Oregon delegates to the Board responsibility for the conduct and governance of schools. Within these constraints, the Hillsboro School District 1J Board views its required functions in these broad areas:

- 1. Develop, enacts, and evaluates policy that directs administrative action;
- 2. Adopt an educational course of study and goals which will guide both the Board and staff toward the continuing improvement of the education program;
- 3. Appoints a Superintendent delegated to establish administrative regulations to implement Board policy and goals;
- 4. Evaluates the Superintendent's performance;
- 5. Adopts a budget;
- 6. Provide for an annual audit of financial affairs;
- 7. Establishment and maintenance of records as required by law;
- 8. Provide for the dissemination of information to the public relating to the schools;
- 9. Establish the days of the year and the hours of the day when school will be in session;
- 10. Propose bond issues for capital expenditures;
- 11. Provide a process to act and hear community input;
- 12. Direct the collective bargaining process to establish labor contracts with the District's personnel. Establish, through the collective bargaining process where appropriate, salaries and salary schedules, other terms and conditions of employment.

Board Member Standards of Conduct

Board members will treat with dignity and courtesy other Board members, the Superintendent, staff members, and members of the public, and will provide an opportunity for all parties to be heard with due respect for their opinions.

Board members will recognize the Superintendent as the executive officer to whom the Board has delegated administrative authority to establish regulations and oversee the implementation of Board policy.

A Board member has the right to express personal opinions. When expressing such opinions in public, the Board member should clearly identify the opinions as his/her own.

A Board member will respect the privacy rights of individuals when dealing with confidential information gained through association with the District.

A Board member shall not disclose information discussed or reviewed in executive session.

Board members individually and the Board as a public entity subscribe to the Code of Ethics for public officials provided in state law.

A Board member will utilize social media Web sites judiciously by not posting confidential information about students, staff members, or District business. Board members will treat fellow Board members, staff members, students, and the public with respect while posting, and will adhere to Oregon Public Meetings Laws when communicating with other Board members via Web sites or other electronic means.

Individual Board Member's Authority and Responsibilities

An individual Board member exercises the authority and responsibility of his/her position when the Board is in legal session only.

A Board member has the authority to act in the name of the Board when authorized by a specific Board motion. When authorized to act as the District's designated representative in collective bargaining, a Board member may make and accept proposals in bargaining subject to subsequent approval by the Board.

A Board member has the right to express personal opinions. When expressing such opinions in public, the Board member must clearly identify the opinions as his/her own.

Members will be knowledgeable of information requested through Board action, supplied by the Superintendent, gained through attendance at District events, and through professional Board activities.

Members of the Board will adhere to the following in carrying out the responsibilities of membership:

1. Request for Information

Any individual Board member who desires a copy of an existing written report or survey prepared by the administrative staff will make such a request to the Superintendent. A copy of the material may be made available to each member of the Board. Requests for the generation of reports or information which require additional time or expense to the District must be submitted to the Board for consideration.

2. Requests for Legal Opinions

Any Board member may request a legal opinion. Such request, however, shall be made through the Board chair to the Superintendent. If the legal opinion sought involves the Superintendent's employment or performance, the request should be made to the Board chair. Legal counsel is responsible to the Board.

3. Action on Complaints or Requests Made to Board Members

When Board members receive complaints or requests for action from staff, students, or members of the public, such information is to be conveyed to the Superintendent for action.

4. Board Member's Relationship to Administration

Individual Board members will be informed about the District's educational program, may visit schools or other facilities to gain information, and may request information from the Superintendent. Board members will not intervene in the administration of the District or its schools.

5. Contracts or Agreements Made By Individual Board Members

Contracts or agreements made by individual Board members without the Board's authority are invalid.

In addition to the other materials provided, the following information regarding Board activities, time commitments, and miscellaneous notes may be helpful for school board candidates.

Board Meetings

Board meetings are usually scheduled on Tuesday evenings, once or twice each month. The meeting schedule is approved by the Board for the upcoming school year. Special sessions may be added or changes made to the approved schedule in accordance with public meetings laws.

Committees

Board members are invited to serve on many District committees and teams. Examples include:

Individual Board members may also be selected for state or regional committees, such as the OSBA Legislative Policy Committee and Metro's Policy Advisory Committee.

Professional Development

- Board members are expected to participate in professional development in the course of their tenure on the Board. New Board members are asked to attend classes offered by Oregon School Boards Association (OSBA) on Board duties and related topics, such as bargaining, the legislative process, etc.
- Attendance at OSBA regional events is encouraged, as is attendance at the OSBA annual conference in the fall.

- Attendance at the National School Board Association (NSBA) annual conference is encouraged for new Board members, if the budget allows.
- Periodically, the Board will participate in other professional development opportunities, including events with other school boards.

School Visits & District Events

- Board members make regular visits to schools throughout the year, and meet regularly with union representatives
- Superintendent Coffee Chats (optional attendance for Board members)
- High School Graduations
- Valedictorian Lunch—May
- Faith Lunch—October
- Board members may also represent the District at community events, such as the Hillsboro Rotary (Thursdays), the Hillsboro Schools Foundation Gala & Auction (February), and the Hillsboro Chamber's Crystal Apple Awards (February or March)

Miscellaneous Notes

- More than three Board members at a meeting constitutes a quorum, which must meet in public and adhere to public meeting laws.
- Board members may not conduct business in private. They may have closed meetings if the topic is one of a limited number that can legally be discussed in an executive session.
- Board members may not have private conference calls or sequential phone calls or emails with one another about Board business.
- The District will pay for Board members to attend various functions, for example: OSBA conference registration and parking; NSBA registration, airfare, hotel and meals (for new Board members, if the budget allows); other pertinent conference registrations; etc.
 - O Many times, Board members elect to pay certain expenses independently without requesting reimbursement from the District. Board members who use personal credit cards and request reimbursement for District travel or other District business may not receive incentives, such as cash reimbursements, frequent flyer miles, or other benefits that are based on the dollar amount of the purchases.
 - When Board members serve on OSBA committees or the NSBA board, their expenses for related activities are paid by OSBA or NSBA, respectively.
- When Board meetings begin before 6:00 p.m., the District generally provides a light, inexpensive dinner.
- The average time commitment for Board members is 10-15 hours per week, considering all the
 activities, attending Board meetings, reading Board packets, and doing other research, as
 necessary.
- A flexible job is almost a requirement for a Board member, since there are many activities that take place during the course of the work day.
